A godly Remnant Genesis 4:17-5:32

"The fifth chapter of Genesis is a genealogy—a list of the descendants of Adam down to the time of Noah and the great flood. There are not many patriarchs, though there were probably more than are actually listed here. But they were pillars of faith in an increasingly godless age. They stood for God with such tenacity and in such a way that their names have been preserved for future generations.

Martin Luther, who identified with the antediluvian period because of the troubles of his own age, was particularly impressed with these outstanding individuals. He wrote that most were living at the same time and then noted: 'This is the greatest glory of the primitive world, that it had so many good, wise, and holy men at the same time. We must not think that these are ordinary names of plain people; but, next to Christ and John the Baptist, they were the most outstanding heroes this world has ever produced. And on the Last day we shall behold and admire their grandeur. Likewise, we shall also see their deeds. For then it will be made manifest what Adam, Seth, Methuselah, and the others did: what they endured from the old serpent; how they comforted and maintained themselves by means of the hope of the Seed against the outrages of the world or of the Cainites; how they experienced various kinds of treachery; how much envy, hatred, and contempt they endured on account of the glory of blessed Seed who would be born from their descendants." I. Cain's genealogy represents the cravings of sinful man, the lust of the eyes and the boasting of what he has and does, which does not come from the Father but from the world. Those who stubbornly and willfully participate, embrace, desire, and love it will, like the world, pass away. It's an irrefutable fact that they, like Cain's line, will stand before the great white throne judgment at the end of ages to find their names missing from the book of life. All that they lived for good or bad, will amount to nothing as they face an eternity in hell for their unwillingness to put their faith in the gospel of Jesus Christ.
