A Proper Response to Royalty Mark 11:1-11

"...Jesus refused to be acknowledged as anything except the King! In fact, he said that if people stopped worshipping him, then the whole universe would fill the silence with praise. Jesus could not and would not deny that this is what he truly deserved. Therefore, Palm Sunday is one of the clearest proofs that Jesus really claimed to be the Christ; it shows us for sure that he is our God and our King.

Will you give King Jesus the honor that he royally deserves? As amazing as it must have been to see his triumphant ride into Jerusalem, Jesus has even more glory now. After he was crucified for our sins, he was raised from the dead and then exalted to the right hand of God, where he sits on his royal throne. The King may not be on parade today, but even now he is receiving the homage he deserves from people all over the world –men, women and children saved by his grace... So give Jesus the honor he deserves: acknowledge his sovereign kingship by throwing your life down before him to govern everything you think, say and do." Ryken

I. Scripture is a comparison between what a godless world is like and what the kingdom of God is like. The Lord shows us the difference between godlessness and godliness, unrighteousness and righteousness, wickedness, and holiness. He shows us how the righteous are to act and live and how the unrighteous act and live.
