Ι. Our study of the book of Genesis draws to a close this morning. It has given us a rich understanding of salvation history. Perhaps, as he drew his last breath, his thoughts were on the fact that God had truly been with him throughout his journey of faith. A testimony to all of us who worship God knowing that His promises stand true to us no matter what living in this fallen world might bring. It is, therefore, best to finish well knowing that we too will be gathered to our people, the redeemed saints of God, maybe sooner than we realize. Thus we cannot miss the point: It was God in the full significance of these names and metaphoric appellations who had delivered Joseph and sustained him—and who would effect further blessings in his life. And for us his children, God has 'blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world' (Ephesians 1:3, 4a). The promise of his care for us is equally astonishing. Our awesome God will effect our care and blessing!" Kent Hughes
